SOAPY SEDAN SCUMMY STREAMS CONNECTION

For many, car washing is a springtime ritual. Often citizens don't know that by washing all that winter grime off their vehicles they might actually be causing harm to our local waterways. Water entering storm drains, unlike water that enters sanitary sewers, does not undergo treatment before it is discharged into our waterways. When cars are washed on streets and driveways, that dirty water eventually winds up in rivers, streams, creeks and lakes. Washing one car may not seem to be a problem, but collectively car washing activity adds up to big problems for our local lakes, creeks and streams.

Pollution associated with car washing degrades water quality while also finding its way in sediments, impacting aquatic habitats. If you must wash your car at home, use the environmentally friendly car washing tips listed below to reduce water use and prevent stormwater pollution:

- Use a bucket and special biodegradable soap. Use as little soap and water as possible. Look for products that do not contain nonylphenol surfactants that act as endocrine disrupters that change the sex of fish and phosphates that contribute to algal blooms and low oxygen levels in waterways. When you are done, dump your bucket of soapy water into a sink, drain or toilet that goes to a treatment system or into a vegetated area.

- Use a trigger spray nozzle to control water flow from the hose and reduce water use.
- Wash the car on a grassy area or other porous surface where soil microbes and vegetation can filter and break down pollutants and keep wash water out of the street and storm drains.
- You can also dike off your driveway and direct wash water into a landscaped area or vacuum it up with a ShopVac rather than allowing it to run into the street.
- Support environmentally friendly charity car wash events that block off nearby storm drains, use minimal amounts of water, and divert wash water to the sanitary sewer or nearby landscaping

Each week children ages three to ten will have a chance to learn about a different animal, listen to stories about that animal, participate in games and group activities and finish up with a craft. The program is free and no advance registration is required.

The library is also offering Summer Reading Clubs for preschoolers and school age children. Preschoolers and kindergartners can join the Read-to-Me Club in which they listen to stories read by others. School-age children do their own reading; they can record their reading either by the number of books read or the time spent reading.

Churchill children can sign up at the story hours or at the Reading Club Kick-Off Party on Monday, June 9 at noon at the Library in Edgewood. Children will enjoy the performance by Pittsburgh Puppet Works entitled "Bugsy and the Critter Jamboree". Kids will receive a snack and will be able to register for a fun summer of reading and fun. Once registered readers bring their folders to either of the above programs or the library to record their reading activities. Children who listen to ten books, read at least ten books or read for at least ten hours will receive prizes at the end of the summer and an invitation to a party held at Koenig Field in Edgewood on Monday, August 11 at noon.

New residents seldom know more than the people next-door. In the past, families got to know other families through involvement with the Churchill schools' PTAs. Many residents worked at Westinghouse and knew each other through their employment. Many women didn't work then and were more involved with community organizations, such as the Scouts, while the men coached Little League baseball. The world has changed and today, there are few unifying activities that serve to introduce residents to each other.



The Churchill Recreation Board has tried various offerings to get our residents involved. The response has been minimal. At this point the Churchill Recreation Board is going to try again, — but this time we need YOU to make it happen. The Board has four members, yet it is chartered to have nine members. 
A mission statement and list of appointed members will soon be augmented with updated scholarship application information and new environmental advisories. Check it out from time to time. Sincere appreciation goes to Peggy Carpenter, a Churchill representative on the Council whose environmental consulting firm, CP Environmental Group, Inc., designed and maintains the site at no charge.

"WATER: NOT A DROP TO WASTE" – a new advisory will be available at the Borough Office in early June. With Water Authority rates up 15% and Alcosan sewage bills up 9% this year, everyone can benefit from the suggestions in this advisory. They are guaranteed to **help lower your bills** – a good deal for your pocketbook and for the environment. Remember, in addition to the water and sewage rate hikes, all municipalities (including Churchill) in the mandated EPA Consent Order impose a water use surcharge. In Churchill that surcharge is \$2 per thousand gallons. Although this is one of the lowest surcharges in our area, and the money is used solely for sewer improvement work to eliminate sanitary sewer overflows, it adds significantly to your quarterly water/sewer bill and provides yet another incentive to conserve.

ELECTION PREPARATION

Churchill's participation in elections has usually been among the highest in Allegheny County. We can be proud of our past voter turnouts, but we always aspire to do even better.

For the presidential contest on November 4, 2008 it is not too early to register to vote. If you are not already registered or if you will be **18 years old on or before election day**, pick up a registration form at the Borough Building. If you are college bound this fall be sure to register before heading off to school. Then, in early October, have an **absentee ballot** request form sent to you by phoning 412-350-4520, or pick one up at the Borough Building. Voting by absentee ballot is a two-step procedure so allow enough time. Make sure your elderly or ill neighbors get absentee ballots if needed or offer them a ride to the polls. If you will be out of town over election day, you are eligible to vote absentee. **Completed absentee ballots must be received at the Allegheny County Elections Division by October 31, 2008. New registration forms must be received at the Election Division by October 3, 2008.** Questions about voting, registering, absentee ballots? Ink and Toner Cartridges are accepted at Office Depot, Office Max, and Staples stores. You may even get some credit on a new cartridge. Bottles, jars, and all metal cans can be taken to the Churchill Area Volunteer Center at **the parking lot behind the WHSD Admin. Bldg.** (Greensburg Pike) on **the first Sunday of each month from 10 AM to 1 PM.** Newspapers, junk mail, and other used paper (no phone books or cardboard) can go into any of the colorful Abitibi bins located at: **Churchill Borough Building's lower parking lot, Beulah Presbyterian Church parking area, Tykes Shell Station on Greensburg Pike, and Woodland Hills Administration Building rear parking lot.**

Everything: plastics #1-5, glass, metal, cardboard, paper, books, and some e-waste (desktop computers, keyboards, **but NO laptops, monitors or TVs**) can go to Construction Junction and Hi-Tech Scrap at 214 N. Health and Safety Reminders:

Summer is almost here, with high temperatures and humidity levels that favor many pest species. Now is the time to:



Check your property for standing, stagnant water. Add "**Mosquito Dunks**" to control these disease spreading insects in an environmentally sound way or add **feeder fish** (Elmer's Aquarium Wm Penn Highway, Monroeville).

Secure all garbage in bags that are placed in garbage cans with tightly fitting lids to that keep out raccoons and other critters. Remove your cans from the curb on the day of collection.

Clean up after your pets and deposit the waste in your home toilet, or wrap it well for the garbage. All dogs must be leashed when outside the home.
